
Art Lovers Book Club

A program organized and hosted by the Figge Docents



The Secret Lives of Color by Kassia St. Clair



From blonde to ginger, the brown that changed the way battles were fought to the white that protected against the plague, Picasso's blue period to the charcoal on the cave walls at Lascaux, acid yellow to Kelly green, and from scarlet women to imperial purple, these surprising stories run like a bright thread throughout history. 
Sargent's Women: Four lives behind the Canvas by Donna M. Lucey

A lively and deeply researched group biography of the vibrant figures who invented modernist art in bohemian Paris at the dawn of the twentieth century. A lively and concise account...Roe is very good at synthesizing and distilling a complicated art movement with ideas without getting bogged down. A great introduction to one of the most pivotal periods in the 20th century. (paperback \$9.85)



Stolen Beauty: A Novel by Laurie Lico Albanese

Rembrandt's Nose: Of Flesh and Spirit in the Master's Portraits by Michael Taylor and Rembrandt

Taylor looks at Rembrandt's self-portraits, historical paintings, and biblical scenes, and identifies how it was that the artist rendered his subjects so alive, so full of earthy, flesh-and-blood vitality-which all boils down to his treatment of the nose. *Rembrandt's Nose* is a gem of a book, an intimate, candid and extremely entertaining engagement with the works of art themselves, interwoven with racy historical snippets that contextualize the artist's breakthroughs and techniques. It includes some 49 reproductions, as well as a complete chronology of Rembrandt's life. (\$7.50 Amazon)
