



# Director's Corner

### **GEORGIA O'KEEFFE**

The new year brought big changes to our American Scene Gallery. The Gift of Education, George Rickey's monumental WPA mural, has returned to its original home, Knox College. No doubt it will be the source of many conversations, as it has been during its time at the Figge. In its place, we are excited to present, for the spring, a masterpiece of American art: Georgia O'Keeffe's Flower Abstraction from 1924, on generous loan from the Whitney Museum of American Art (see cover).

We regularly bring whole exhibitions, with 40 or more works, from other museums to the Figge. Bringing in just one exceptional work is new for us. Given that it is a signature work from one of the best-loved American



artists, it's a bit like staging a solo recital by an acclaimed soprano instead of bringing in a whole orchestra to perform a symphony. With the myriad of choices facing us each day hundreds of channels on television, a barrage of messages and images on our phones and laptops, products from every corner of the world available at a moment's notice on the web or in our local stores, we are making this activity simple: Just look at one painting!

I invite you to take a few minutes, over the next couple of months, to spend some quality time with our distinguished quest. Look at how carefully O'Keeffe has applied the paint, at the delicate shadings she has given to the flower's ruffled petals, at the way the shapes float upward at the center of the painting like clouds of mist.

Think about O'Keeffe's long and colorful life, which took her from Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, to the center of the New York art world, and then to the arid backcountry of New Mexico. The painting reflects the influence of the art movements of the time, but also other innovations: air travel, avant-garde music, psychoanalysis and the growing understanding of the structure and working of all organisms. With her characteristic, straightforward elegance, O'Keeffe invites us to see the familiar with new eyes.

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# Wynn Bullock Revelations

JANUARY 13-APRIL 29, 2018

his exhibition represents the most comprehensive assessment of photographer Wynn Bullock's (1902-1975) extraordinary career in nearly 40 years and is the first major exhibition of his work to be held in lowa.

Bullock's artistic practice was guided by an interest in the mid-20th-century dialogue about the structure of the universe and humanity's place within it. Drawn to the spirit of experimentation that marked scientific and philosophical endeavors of his day, Bullock used his knowledge of quantum physics, special relativity and the space-time continuum as a reference point for his own intuitive and personal explorations of the world.

Bullock worked in the American Modernist tradition alongside his colleagues and friends Edward Weston, Harry Callahan and Ansel Adams. He garnered enormous acclaim during his lifetime, yet the breadth of his career has remained largely in the shadows since his death in 1975. The exhibition surveys the arc of Bullock's innovative achievements in more than 70 vintage prints, which include early experimental works of the 1940s to his late metaphysical photographs of the 1970s.

Wynn Bullock: Revelations was curated by Brett Abbott, director of collections and exhibitions, Amon Carter Museum of American Art in Fort Worth and former curator of photography at the High Museum of Art in Atlanta. The exhibition was organized by the High Museum of Art, Atlanta, in collaboration with the Center for Creative Photography, Tucson.

# Steve Sinner:: Master Woodturner

### **FEBRUARY 17-JUNE 24, 2018**

Having worked with wood as his primary medium for more than 50 years, local artist Steve Sinner has mastered the art of woodturning. Woodturning is the process of fastening wood to a lathe that rotates around a centralized axis, allowing artists to use a series of chisels, gouges and other implements to carve away portions of the raw wood to create symmetrical forms. Traditionally, this process was used to create furniture legs, tool handles and other household implements. Sinner is one of a number of artists who use this technique to create finely crafted vessels. These vessels often have walls thinner than 1/8 inch, transforming rough blocks of wood into elegant forms.

The surface of Sinner's vessels range from meticulously rendered geometric forms based on algorithms to figurative allegories. These designs are created from a combination of mediums, including acrylic paint, gold leaf, ink and urethane. Other surfaces are embellished by selectively removing sections of the vessel, producing a screen of perforations that allow light to permeate the form.

In addition to his independent work, Sinner seeks out local artists like Katie Kiley and Joe Meirhaeghe with whom to collaborate. The resulting works are remarkable combinations of form, material and surface decoration.

Steve Sinner: Master Woodturner highlights nearly 30 examples of Sinner's solo work and collaborations as well as his innovations within the art form.

Since 1955, the Rock Island Art Guild, a volunteer-run organization, has supported the arts in the Quad-City region through exhibitions, educational programs and scholarships. This year, the guild's 40th juried exhibition will be installed in the Figge's fourth-floor gallery, on view through May 20.

The exhibition is open to artists within a 150-mile radius of the Ouad Cities, and is juried from online submissions.

"The Rock Island Art Guild began with a single purpose of bringing artists and the public together 'to cultivate an active interest in local art talent," said Holly Sparkman, president. "The first juried fine arts exhibition in 1977 was a big undertaking for the guild. It set the tone for the health and wellbeing of the arts in the community and gave local artists a needed showcase.

guild is still made up of dedicated longtime volunteers, and the same integrity and dedication to helping artists achieve their potential remain intact. The guild is proud to be connected with the Figge Art Museum for this benchmark exhibition and looks forward to many more fine arts exhibitions to come."

This year's exhibition juror is Dr. Patricia McDonnell, director of the Wichita Art Museum. Prior to joining the Wichita Museum in 2012, Dr. McDonnell served as director of the Ulrich Museum of Art at Wichita State University. She was chief curator at the Tacoma Art Museum, and worked as a curator at the Weisman Art Museum at the University of Minnesota, the Rhode Island School of Design, and the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden

history from Brown University, with a focus on 20th-century American art and the painter Marsden Hartley, about whom she has published numerous books and articles.

Dr. McDonnell selected the artworks for the exhibition from online entries, and selected the award-winners after seeing the works in person.

# Joseph Lappie: Personal Mythologies

FEBRUARY 24-MAY 20, 2018

Joseph Lappie: Personal Mythologies encompasses more than a decade of the artist's work. Myths, gods and people mingle in skillfully carved woodblocks, artist's books and prints. The figures crouch and contort, transform into beasts and look out at the viewer with raw emotion.

Lappie's expressive and haunting imagery reflects the human psyche as well as the cultural environment that shapes us. He references shared narratives passed down through centuries, including the Nuremberg Chronicle and stories of trickster gods Anansi and Loki. By engaging universal allegories and his own experiences, he provokes viewers to consider the relationship between our private realities and the outside world.

Lappie, an associate professor of art at St. Ambrose University, is a graduate of Columbia College in Chicago and Ball State University in Muncie, Ind. Throughout his career, he has worked with lithography, etching, letterpress, woodblock printing, painting and book arts.

Beginning about 10 years ago, Lappie began to shift traditional notions of printmaking, wherein the print is considered the artistic product, by creating installations of the carved wood blocks used to create prints. This exhibition includes three substantial bodies of work in this mode. By including a variety of Lappie's work, the exhibition will highlight his range as a printmaker and as an artist.

# Georgia O'Keeffe: Flower Abstraction, 1924

Flower Abstraction (see cover), a landmark painting by Georgia O'Keeffe, is on view in the American Scene Gallery through June 10. The Whitney Museum of American Art generously loaned the painting to the Figge in reciprocity for the numerous Grant Wood artworks and other items from the City of Davenport Art Collection included in the exhibition *Grant Wood: American Gothic and Other Fables*, on view at the Whitney from March 2 through June 10.

Flower Abstraction was painted in 1924 when O'Keeffe had joined the circle of avant-garde artists that formed around the charismatic photographer and gallery owner Alfred Stieglitz, whom she would later marry. The cropping of the image reflects the influence of photographers such as Paul Strand, who were using the camera to make innovative abstract images. By enlarging and abstracting her subject, O'Keeffe sought to call attention to her own singular view of nature. As she wrote:

"A flower is relatively small. Everyone has many associations with a flower—the idea of flowers. You put out your

hand and touch the flower—lean forward to smell it—maybe touch it with your lips almost without thinking—or give it to someone to please them. Still—in a way—nobody sees a flower—really—it is so small and we haven't time—and to see takes time, like to have a friend takes time. If I could paint the flower exactly as I see it no one would see what I see because I would paint it small like the flower is small. So I said to myself—I'll paint what I see—what the flower is to me but I'll paint it big and they will be surprised into taking time to look at it—I will make even busy New Yorkers take time to see what I see of flowers."

O'Keeffe's flower paintings caught the attention of critics, who interpreted their soft colors and ruffled forms as an expression of female eroticism and the sensibilities of a woman artist. To which O'Keeffe responded: "Well—I made you take time to look at what I saw and when you took time to really notice my flower you hung all your own associations

with flowers on my flower and you write about my flower as if I think and see what you think and see of the flower—and I don't."

# Ruth Gaines Thomas Endowment \_\_\_\_



In September, as a memorial and celebration of the life of arts educator Ruth Gaines Thomas, her late husband, Glenn Thomas, and her sons, John Gaines and Kenneth Casey Gaines, established the Ruth Gaines Thomas Endowment with a major gift of \$50,000.

For decades Ruth was referred to fondly by elementary children in Davenport as "the art lady." She drew on her passion for the arts to inspire her young students. "Ruth was involved with the Figge and its predecessor the Davenport Museum of Art for as long as I can remember," said her friend Linda Lewis. "She loved being a docent."

The Endowment was established to support the Major Exhibitions Endowment and to provide elementary and parochial students with arts education through Figge programs. In addition to helping to bring a major exhibition to the Figge every other year, the Ruth Gaines Thomas Endowment will support the *Young Artists* exhibitions, serving all participating school districts in Iowa and Illinois.

Days before his passing, her husband Glenn said, "We were so excited to have made a contribution to the Figge in Ruth's name. I think she would have really appreciated our gift, bringing joy and the love of art to the many children she would not have the opportunity to meet and laugh with in her classrooms."

"We are pleased to support the Figge and their efforts that enrich our community; my mom would have been pleased," said John Gaines, Ruth's son. "I wish Glenn could have been here to see the openings of the Young Artists exhibitions and the French Moderns exhibition, and to see the impact of the gift on the lives of Quad-City students and their families. I'm sure he would have raised a glass of beer in her honor, as he said, 'Cheers to you, my Love.'"

As per the wishes of her family, the Ruth Gaines Thomas Endowment will remain open. Those who wish to honor Ruth and Glenn with a gift in their names are welcome to do so.



### Crafted by Hand

Many of the Figge Museum Store's newest treasures were crafted by hand. Stop by to see such handiwork as pendants with porcelain tiles that look like a pen-and-ink drawing on one side and a watercolor image on the other. These reversible charms are mounted in a sterling silver branch shaped into ovals, circles and squares. They are just one example of the beautiful craftsmanship that goes into Eldreth Designs' jewelry, all produced in a workshop that has been in the family for years.

Trovelore practices hand-craftsmanship that dates back centuries to bring color and wearability to butterflies, dragonflies and the honeybee. The embellished pins feature hand beading that marries art and nature.

The Museum Store's first Top Shelf feature was celebrated last September with local artist Caroline England. She gilded ginko leaves, and cut and layered fabric, paintings and textured paper to make her special cards. Sadly, Caroline passed away on October 31.
